- **Classification Criteria (Revised):** As of July 2020, MSMEs are classified based on a combined composite criterion of investment in plant/machinery and annual turnover.

Micro: Investment \leq Rs. 1 cr and Turnover \leq rs.5 Cr

Small: Investment \leq Rs. 10 cr and Turnover \leq rs.50 Cr

Medium: Investment \leq Rs. 50 cr and Turnover \leq rs.250 Cr

- **High Employment Generation:** Being labor-intensive, they are the second largest employer after agriculture, providing jobs to over 11 crore people, often in rural or semi-urban areas.
- **Localized Operations & Resources:** These enterprises often use indigenous raw materials and local resources, helping to reduce regional imbalances and promote self-reliance.

- **Structure:** They are often family-owned or, in the case of micro-enterprises, "one-man shows," with the owner handling multiple roles (marketing, finance, HR).
